



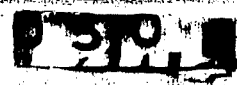

Dear Sir

When you saw how I forgot to tell you that
 I had an order from Government to get the land that the
 following people are entitled to in 1842 and if any of
 the estates are lying and will send me a paper form of
 attorney to sell, a minute, a posse, transfer, assign, and
 possibly convey, such land as they may claim and an order
 recorded in the Surveyor General's office, by an order from
 the Executive Council. I will act under the authority
 then and will if I can succeed in own getting them
 at a price on half, that is every dollar of 200 acres I
 will give to the heir, a party claiming or will give
 the price down that is 100 cents for their half all the
 form of attorney must state the sum of \$25 (accused
 of own) as an accompaniment that they are being this

 title and interest to any deed or deed. I may get
 from Government, and \$25 for an Salisbury deed
 to the same effect under a form of attorney to demand
 the deed and for the better duties, I wish
 from you for the same you as his claim. if you need
 you that you attend I may get health to see the
 property. I am afraid that the note may also will

 anything more than the lot the above mentioned on

My Dear Uncle

As this is a favourable opportunity I have set myself down to write you a few lines - I arrived here on Saturday last & am very much pleased with York - it looks very much like Troy - We should be highly delighted to have the pleasure of your company for a few days - here there is a room empty which will be at all times ready for you should you ever visit us - Willington left us on Monday he has gone down to keep the store in Montreal - Theodore & myself staying here This store is getting on very well - it is on a very moderate scale here - but will increase yearly in stock - However it will be better for you to come up & judge for yourself - When you might take it into your head to give us a couple of thousand pounds

I delivered your letter to Mr Oakley - he is in
 gaol & is likely to die there I spoke to
 Mr Baldwin (the lawyer) and he says he
 has no prospects of ever getting out
 Send us up your chocolate & saisons they
 will sell very well here to our Winter Custom-
 -ers & very moderate rates - any article will sell
 here if they are not charged at high rates -
 Do you want any flour? if so we will buy
 you some - it Cash here - the lowest

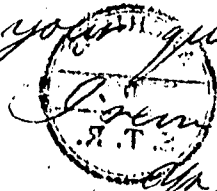


Dear Uncle

Frances received yours and mentioned to me that you had not received an answer to your letter containing the drafts. I assure you I acknowledge the receipt of it two days after Papa got it. Cotterell H^o accepted them but the rest did not. I have seen Whistart - he lives at Lachine - as also Jackson who is going to allow it to be carried on I can let your house for 10 years if you will consent to build a shed to hold a horse & allow payable monthly in advance - at the rate of £24 - If not I can let it for 5 years for good security at £22.10 - If this will suit you I will be oblig to you for an answer. I cannot find out where Hughes lives - Williams will pay me when he comes back from Lachine - he has been there for a week

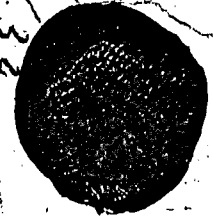
