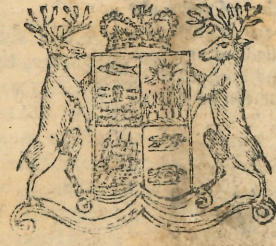

**Rules and Regulations for the Cart-
ton Ferry.**

I. THE Ferryman shall keep two good and sufficient Boats for the Long Ferry, and one good and sufficient Boat and Scow for the Short Ferry over to Thomas Merritt's.

II. The two boats for the Long Ferry shall be constantly plying from side to side, each and every day, between sun rise in the morning and nine o'clock in the evening in Summer, and seven o'clock in the evening in Winter. Neither of them shall remain on one side more than a quarter of an hour at a time, provided any passenger shall be in readiness to cross; and they shall never be both on one side at the same time; but as soon as one boat shall strike the shore, the other if on the same side, shall immediately push off. The place of landing at low water, shall be in the slip at the end of Union-Street, and when the tide is high enough to admit of it with convenience, at the stairs at Mr. Peters' wharf.

III. The boat and scow for the Short Ferry shall always be in readiness and be well attended, to ply from one side to the other as the case may require.

IV. The rates of Ferrage for each of the two Ferries to be paid upon getting on board of the boat or scow as the case may be, before pushing off, shall be as follows, viz.

AT A COMMON COUNCIL, holden at the CITY-HALL of the CITY of SAINT JOHN, on Tuesday the sixteenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixteen.

An Ordinance to establish the Rates of CARTAGE, in the City of Saint John, on the eastern side of the harbour.

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of Saint John, in Common Council convened, That for the purpose of regulating the Prices & Rates of Cartage within that part of the said City, lying to the Eastward of the Harbour of Saint John, the same be divided into Five Districts as follows, to wit:

The First District, to extend from the Public Landing in the Upper Cove, to any part of John Water, or Dock Street; to that part of Prince William Street between Prince Street and Samuel Miles' house inclusive; to that part of King's Street lying to the Westward of Germain Street; and to any part of Church or Cross Streets.

The Second District, to extend from the same Public Landing to any place without or beyond the First District and in any part of Germain Street to the Northward of the Church; and in any part of York Point, beyond the property of Mr. Jennings.

The Third District, to extend from the same Public Landing to any place without or beyond the Second District, in any part of Prince William-Street; in any part of Prince and Duke's-Streets, west of Charlotte-Street, in any part of Germain-Street or Charlotte-Street north of Queen-Street; in any part of Union-Street west of Charlotte-Street, and in any part of the upper, or Northern end of Prince William-Street.

The Fourth District to extend from the same Public Landing to any place without or beyond the third District in any part of King's Square; in any part of the residue of Germain-Street; in any part of Queen's, Saint James' and Saint Andrew's-Streets, west of Charlotte-Street; in any part of Prince and Duke-Streets, and the north side of Queen's Square, west of Sidney-Street.

The Fifth District to extend from the said Public Landing to any place without or beyond the Fourth District.

II And be it further ordained, That the Prices or Rates of Cartage shall be as set down and expressed in the following Table, for loading, carting and unloading (and housing in some cases) the articles therein mentioned from the said Public Landing or any of the Wharves or Landing Places within the limits of the said first District, to any place within the five several Districts, that is to say—

III. And be it further ordained, That for the cartage or carriage of any the before enumerated articles from one place to another within the same District, the same rates or prices of cartage, and no greater shall be demanded or taken as are herein before provided for the first District above mentioned; and for the cartage or carriage of any of the same articles from any one District to another District next adjoining, the same rates or prices of cartage, and no greater shall be demanded or taken as are herein before provided for the second District above mentioned; and for the cartage or carriage of any of the same articles from any one District to another District not next adjoining, the same rates or prices, and no greater shall be demanded or taken as are herein before provided for the third, fourth and fifth Districts respectively: that is to say, if one District intervenes the rates or prices for the third, if two, the rates or prices for the fourth, and if three, the rates or prices for the fifth to be taken.

IV. And be it further ordained, That if any cartman or person by him employed, shall ask, demand, receive, take, or exact any greater rate or rates, price or prices, than are above mentioned and limited for loading, carting and unloading (and for housing in certain cases, as herein before expressed) any Goods, Wares, Merchandises, Wood, or other things as aforesaid, every such cartman shall upon conviction thereof before the Mayor, Recorder, or any one of the Aldermen, be by the Mayor suspended from being a cartman, immediately after such conviction (if before the Mayor) or otherwise immediately after a certificate of such conviction shall be transmitted to the Mayor: and such cartman shall also forfeit and pay the sum of twenty shillings.

V. And be it further ordained, That any cartman who shall refuse to be employed with his horse and cart when called upon, not being employed at the time, the owner or driver of such team, shall be liable to a penalty of ten shillings.

VI. And be it further ordained, That whenever the horse and cart of any cartman shall be standing unloaded in the Market Square or any other public situation, such cartman, and horse and cart shall be deemed and taken to be unemployed.

VII. And be it further ordained, That every cartman shall have his cart properly fitted with a good and sufficient Box for the purpose of carting vegetables, coals, and other articles requiring a Box: and every cartman, who shall at any time be deficient of the same when called upon to carry articles requiring such Box, shall for each default forfeit and pay the sum of ten shillings.

VIII. And be it further ordained, That every cartman shall cause the number of his Licence to be fairly painted on each side of his Box, under the penalty of five shillings for every offence.

IX. And be it further ordained, That the beforementioned regulations for the prices or rates of cartage and every article herein before contained, shall be construed to extend to Sleds, when in use, in the same manner as to carts.

Extract from a Law of this City entitled "A Law to regulate Cartmen and the sale of Firewood in the City of Saint John"—passed in the year 1795, and confirmed by His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor and His Majesty's Council of this Province:—

12. And be it further ordained, That no person shall drive any Sled, Cart, Truck, or other Carriage for the transportation of any Goods, Firewood or other things whatsoever from one place within this City to another place within the same for hire or wages, unless he shall be appointed and licensed as a Cart-Man by the Mayor for the time being, under the penalty of one shilling for every load or part of a load he shall so drive away.

13. And be it further ordained, That each Cart-Man so licensed, shall immediately cause the Number of his Licence to be fairly painted upon each side of his Cart with red paint easily to be seen, on the square of the after part of the shaft, under the penalty of five shillings for every offence.

At a COMMON COUNCIL, holden at the City-Hall of the City of SAINT JOHN, on Tuesday, the eleventh day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixteen.

A LAW to prevent Nuisances in the City of SAINT JOHN.

I. BE IT ORDAINED, by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonality of the City of Saint John, in Common Council convened, That a law of this Corporation made and passed in the Year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and ninety-five, and allowed and confirmed by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor and His Majesty's Council in this Province, on the first day of April, in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and ninety-six, entitled "A Law for repairing and amending the Streets and Highways in the City of Saint John, and to prevent Nuisances in the said City," be, and the same is hereby repealed.

II. And be it further ordained, That no dirt, filth, manure, stones, earth, rubbish or other incumbrance of any nature or kind whatsoever, shall at any time be brought, thrown or laid in any part of the Streets, Highways, Public Squares or Landing Places, or the Wharves on either side of the Market Slip within the said City, by any person or persons whatsoever, under the penalty of five shillings for each and every offence: And if any person or persons having brought, thrown or laid any dirt, filth, stones, manure, earth, rubbish or other incumbrance, on any part of the Streets, Highways, Public Squares or Landing Places, or the Wharves on either side of the Market Slip, shall neglect or refuse to remove the same, after having been notified, and directed so to do by the Mayor, Recorder or any Alderman of the City, such offender or offenders shall forfeit and pay five shillings for each and every day that such incumbrance shall remain, after having been notified and directed as aforesaid: And in case such incumbrance shall be of any value, and the offender shall not be known or found, it shall and may be lawful for the Mayor, Recorder or any of the Aldermen, to direct any one of the Marshals of the said City to seize the same, who after giving three days public notice in writing to be affixed at the East end of the Market House in King's and Queen's Ward, is hereby authorized to sell such incumbrance so seized and after paying the costs and the amount of the penalty or penalties incurred, to tender the overplus if any, into the hands of the Chamberlain of the said City, for the use of the owner or owners thereof when claimed: And in case such incumbrance shall be of no value and the offender or offenders shall not be known or found, such incumbrance shall be removed by the Surveyor of Highways for the district.

III. And be it further ordained, That no person or persons whatsoever shall keep in his, her or their yards or grounds, either inclosed or uninclosed, or shall throw, put, carry, deposit or place on any other ground inclosed or uninclosed within the said City, any rotten or offensive filth, flesh, offals, vegetables, or other rotten or offensive substance of any kind or nature whatsoever; and if any person or persons whatsoever having done shall neglect or refuse to remove the same, when ordered or directed by the Mayor, Recorder or any one of the Aldermen of the City, such offender or offenders shall forfeit and pay the sum of five shillings for each and every day that he, she or they shall neglect or refuse to remove the same after having been so ordered and directed.

IV. And be it further ordained, That no stair-way, steps, shed, platform or other erection, for the purpose of an entrance or passage into any house, building or premises shall be made to extend or project more than six feet into, over or upon any of the Streets within the said City, where such Street shall be of the width of forty feet and upwards, and in Streets, Lanes or Alleys less than forty feet in width, more than one tenth part of the breadth of such Street, Lane or Alley.

V. And be it further ordained, That it shall not be lawful for any person or persons to drive any cart or to drive or ride any horse or horses along any side path or walk for foot passengers between the gutters and kennels, and the houses on each side of the Street, or in the said kennels or gutters, for any purpose or across such foot path or walk, unless for the purpose of discharging or taking in a load, or of going into or coming out of some yard or inclosure, under the penalty of ten shillings for each and every offence, and if any cartman or other person shall break or otherwise injure any such footpath or walk, such cartman or other person shall within twenty-four hours cause the same to be repaired and amended, under the penalty of ten shillings.

VI. And be it further ordained, That no cartman or other person shall drive or permit his horse or horses in any cart, team or truck, to go faster than a common walk, in any part of the public streets or squares within the City, to the westward of King's-square in King's-street, or in Prince William-street, or any part of Dock-street, or any part of Water or John-street or the public Market square in King's and Queen's Ward, or the Wharves on either side of the Market-slip or in the said Market-slip, under the penalty of ten shillings for each and every offence, to be paid by the owner of such horse and cart or the driver thereof at the election of the party prosecuting.

VII. And be it further ordained, That no person shall ride on horseback in a faster gait than a moderate trot, or be guilty of any disorderly riding within any part of the City on the Eastern side of the Harbour, to the westward of the Eastern line of Charlotte, otherwise called Sudholm-street, between that Street and the Harbour, nor on any part of Saint James's-street, Saint Andrew's-street, or Main-street, lying to the westward of a line running north from the public Well, to the Eastward of Mr. JOHN CLARKE'S bake-house, under the penalty of ten shillings for each and every offence.

VIII. And be it further ordained, That no person of any age or description whatsoever, shall coast or ride for amusement on any sleds or sleds down any of the hills, in any of the streets, lanes or alleys or public squares within the district on the Eastern side of the harbour, between the said harbour and Charlotte-street aforesaid, under the penalty of five shillings for each and every offence: And it is hereby declared to be the duty of the High Constables and the several Constables and

Marshals of the City to take notice of and make complaint against any person or persons offending, and to seize and take the sled or sleds of any such offender, and the same to detain and keep until the payment of the fines which such person or persons so offending shall have incurred.

IX. And be it further ordained, That no person shall water any horse or horses at any one of the public wells in those parts of King's, Queen's and Duke's Wards, either in or to the westward of Charlotte street, under the penalty of ten shillings for each and every offence, and that no person or persons shall carry or use any water from any one of the said wells for the purpose of watering any horse or horses in any stable or other place under the penalty of twenty shillings for each and every offence, which penalties may be recovered from the owner of the horse or horses thus watered or the occupier of the stable or place to which the water shall be carried, or from the person who shall take any horse or horses to any such well to be watered, or carry water from any such well to be given to such horse or horses at the election of the prosecutor.

X. And be it further ordained, That no Goat shall be permitted to go at large within the limits of the said City under the penalty of five shillings to be paid by the owner or proprietor of such Goat, each and every time such goat shall be found going at large in any part of the said City.

XI. And be it further ordained, That no person shall drive any sleigh or sled in any part of the City without two bells to each Horse, under the penalty of ten shillings for each and every offence.

XII. And be it further ordained, That the occupier of the lower or ground floor of each house in the said City shall keep the public drains, gutters and water courses opposite to or in front of their respective houses, out-houses, stables and other buildings or fences, clear of all rubbish, filth, obstruction or impediment to the free course of the water, at their own cost and charge under the penalty of five shillings for each and every offence, and that it shall be the duty of the Surveyor of Highways in their respective districts in the said City to cause all offenders herein to be prosecuted, and also to remove any filth, rubbish or obstruction to the free course of the water in any other of the public drains, gutters or water courses within the said City; and that in such of the streets of the said City as now are or may hereafter be paved, the occupier of such lower or ground floor in the houses on each side of such streets shall cause the pavements to be scraped and cleaned in front of their respective houses and premises as far as the centre of the street, and the dirt to be collected into heaps ready to be thrown into any cart or carts that may come for the same, when and so often as such occupier shall receive notice and directions so to do from the Alderman of the Ward in which such street shall lie under the penalty of ten shillings for each and every neglect or refusal: And that such notice and direction shall be given by the Alderman in their respective Wards once in each month, between the first day of April and the first day of December in each and every year, and not oftener.

XIII. And be it further ordained, That no person shall carry any chips or shavings made from Carpenters' Coopers' or Joiners' work through or over any of the Streets of the City, unless in a sack, bag or basket, or otherwise so secured as to prevent such chips or shavings from being strewn and scattered about, under the penalty of five shillings for each and every offence, to be paid by the person offending, or if such offender be under age then by the parent of the offender or if an apprentice by the Master or Mistress of such apprentice.

XIV. And be it further ordained, That no person shall burn or let fire to any heap or pile of chips, shavings or other combustible matter in any ground inclosed or uninclosed, within the said City, within the distance of two hundred feet of any house or building, under the penalty of five pounds for each and every offence.

XV. And be it further ordained, That no cartman shall unload, deposit or lay any cord wood in and upon any of the gutters in any of the streets in the district on the Eastern side of the Harbour, under the penalty of two shillings for each and every offence.

XVI. And be it further ordained, That no person shall drive any cart, team or truck in any of the streets in the district on the Eastern side of the Harbour in which gutters and kennels are formed on the sides thereof, in such manner as that either of the wheels of such cart, team or truck shall pass nearer than four feet to the centre of any such gutter or kennel, unless when two carts or teams are passing each other under the penalty of five shillings for each and every offence.

XVII. And be it further ordained, That no horse, mare or gelding shall run or go at large in any of the highways, streets, lanes or alleys in the district on the Eastern side of the Harbour, between the Harbour and the west side of Charlotte street, under the penalty of five shillings for each horse, mare or gelding, to be paid by the owner or proprietor of such horse, mare or gelding.

XVIII. And be it further ordained, That the several and respective penalties herein before imposed and ordained, shall and may be recovered and levied in the manner and to the uses directed in and by the Law or Ordinance of this Corporation, entitled "A Law directing the mode of recovery of the Fines, Penalties and Forfeitures," imposed by the laws of the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen and Assistants of the City of Saint John.

LONDON, MAY 31.

We sincerely rejoice that we are able to state, that habits of peace and order are quickly returning in the lately disturbed districts of Norfolk and Suffolk. The decisive measures taken at Littleport had universally spread intimidation among the rioters. The Coroner's Jury had sat on the two persons killed by the soldiery at Littleport, and brought in a verdict of *Justifiable Homicide*: besides which three troops of dragoons, with some infantry, and two pieces of light artillery, had arrived, and been distributed so as to act, if necessary at a moment's notice.

The late disorderly conduct of the lower classes is doubtless in a great measure owing to the habits produced by the existing system of the poor laws. Our readers will have seen with pleasure, that this important and difficult subject has been once more brought forward in the House of Commons; and that a Committee has been appointed to investigate and report on the whole system. Without a fundamental change, it is clear that the moral character of that peasantry which has been entirely destroyed; and that even the present enormous burden of eight millions annually, which the poor-rates impose on the industry and capital of the country must be rapidly augmented.

The subject of the New Coinage was last night brought before Parliament.—There is to be a Coinage of shillings and sixpences to the amount of two and a half millions, of the same standard fineness as now; but there are to be 66 shillings coined out of a pound Troy weight, whereas there was formerly but 62. The new Coinage is expected to be completed in six or seven months.

Last night a new writ was moved for Liverpool, in the room of Mr. Canning, whose appointment as President of the Board of Control has been thus publicly noticed.

French Papers inform us, that Didier having been taken upon the Piedmontese territory, was first carried to Turin, and there interrogated, but was afterwards given up to the French authorities.

A great number of the French Regicides now reside in Switzerland, and many of them are accused of having secretly abetted the late insurrection at Grenoble.

These papers mention some particulars of General Chartrand, who was shot in consequence of the sentence of a Court-Martial at Lisle, on the 22d instant, for the part he took in the rebellion of March 1815. It appears that this person had been made a prisoner of war in 1813; and was not only restored to his country by the first restoration of Louis XVIII. to the throne, but honoured by him with the cross of St. Louis. He, however, accepted a mission from Bonaparte to collect troops in the south, and cut off the retreat of the Duke of Angouleme.

The official paper of Monday last states, that tranquillity has been completely restored in the neighborhood of Grenoble, and that public opinion has been considerably improved, since the defeat of the insurgents in that quarter.

One of the French Journals has a curious speculation in an article from Rome, of dethroning all the Barbary Sovereigns, and forming their territories into a Christian kingdom for the Prince Royal of Etruria, whose Crown, it is added, is to be guaranteed to him by the powers of Europe and the Grand Seignior.

An Evening Paper states, that a private letter from Paris, dated the 27th, gives very interesting accounts of the final downfall of Talleyrand and Fouché. They have decidedly lost the Royal favour.—Blacas, it is supposed, will come into power again.

The French are expediting squadrons for the colonial establishments. One for Pondicherry has sailed from Brest, and two more for Guadaloupe and Senegal are on the point of departure.

Match in High Life.—A marriage we hear, is shortly expected between Lord Clive, eldest Son of the Earl of Powis, and Lady Emma Mount Edgecumbe, the beautiful daughter of the Earl. His Lordship has just entered his 32d year; Lady Emma has nearly completed her twenty-fifth.

Pedestrianism.—The sporting world is again about to be amused by an extraordinary exertion of pedestrianism on the part of Eaton, whose performance on Blackheath, last year, excited so much interest. This pedestrian has been backed for a considerable sum, to walk 1100 miles in as many successive hours, each mile to be performed at the commencement of every hour; an undertaking which will at once deprive him of the possibility of rest at any one time during the execution of the task, beyond that of three quarters of an hour. The pedestrian will commence his herculean labours on Blackheath, on the 4th of June next, the King's birth-day.

Thursday se'night, at 5 minutes past 6, P. M. Wilson, the Blackheath pedestrian, started in the vicinity of Cambridge, to walk 100 miles in 24 successive hours. He failed, however, in his undertaking, by the short distance of a quarter of a mile, having at five minutes past six on Friday evening, performed only 99 miles and three quarters.

JUNE 3.

There is a report, of the accuracy of which we do not pretend to judge, that measures have been taken to induce many of our artisans to go to Russia. Certainly the Russians have recently had extraordinary opportunities of obtaining information respecting every thing particular, both in the machinery and management of British manufactures.

The Emperor Alexander seems to aim at the consolidation, as far as possible, of Poland with his other dominions: he has decreed, that journeying into Poland shall not be considered as passing the Russian frontiers.

Twelve Portuguese vessels, with full cargoes of slaves from Africa, arrived at Bahia in the month of February.

The Drake sloop of war, Capt. Gregory Grant, is arrived at Portsmouth from Jamaica and Havannah; she left Port-Royal on the 7th, and Havannah on the 20th April. There is no particular news by her. The Royalists in South America have yet obtained no better possession of that country than the French once held in Old Spain; only where their armies are posted does their authority extend. A convoy of 7000 mules, laden with specie, lately arrived at Vera Cruz from Mexico, after 3 months' hazardous travelling. The Independents very frequently intercept the weakly protected convoys. The Drake spoke the Junon, Captain Tait, off the Havannah; she was conveying two millions of dollars from Vera Cruz to Port-Royal. The Drake brought 300,000 dollars for merchants.

The Eclipse packet, for India, put into Rio Janeiro on the 3d of March, the crew having mutinied; but Capt. Burford procured fresh hands, and proceeded on his voyage on the 15th.

Lord Cravan is going a tour in the Mediterranean in his yacht, a ship of 300 tons, fitted up with every convenience for his family and some friends. She is commanded by a Master in the Navy, and manned with forty picked seamen. His Lordship proposes to be absent about twelve months. London pap.

Great credit is due to the Watchmen for taking up vagabonds in the streets, so far as their strength will permit, and it is much to be lamented the funds of the City will not allow more of these guardians of our lives, and property.—Last night three men were detected in the act of rolling barrels of tar off the wharf of Mr. N. MERRITT; they were taken into custody by the Watchmen and this day underwent a long examination before His Worship the Mayor and Messrs. Aldermen BARLOW and SANCTON in the City Hall, the result of which was not known when this paper went to press.—Our City has been long in the habit of being disturbed by those nocturnal gentry, and certain we are, by persons who would wish to appear in more respectable characters than those now implicated.

LONDON, JUNE 4.

The King's Health.—Saturday morning her Majesty, accompanied by the Princesses, left the Queen's Palace for Windsor.— They arrived at the Castle at eleven o'clock, when the Queen, after visiting the King, proceeded to hold the monthly council at 12 o'clock, to receive the physicians' report. The Council was attended by the Archbishops of Canterbury and York, the Duke of Montrose, and the Earl of Winchilsea.

The following Bulletin was on Sunday exhibited at St. James's Palace:—

Windsor Castle, June 1.

"His Majesty has enjoyed good bodily health, and has been uniformly tranquil throughout the last month, but his Majesty's disorder is not diminished."

Her Royal Highness the Duchess of Cumberland is now so far advanced in pregnancy as to give the fairest promise of safety; and her physicians allow her to resume the exercise of her carriage.

JUNE 5.

On the 13th instant all the troops in the metropolis and its vicinity will have a grand field day on Wimbledon Common, in commemoration of the battle of Waterloo.— The Prince Regent, Duke of York and all the General Staff in town and its vicinity, will be present on the occasion.

An order was received at Portsmouth on Sunday to disband the 2d battalions of the 5th and 87th regiments, stationed at Gosport. The men are to be turned over to the 1st battalions. The 1st battalion of the 5th is with the Duke of Wellington: the first battalion of the 87th is in India.— It is fully expected that all the 2d battalions of regiments will be disbanded before the close of the year.

THE PRINCE REGENT'S COURT.

Morning Herald, April 27, 1816.

Yesterday at three o'clock, His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT held a Court at Carlton House.

Lieutenant Colonel BOUCHETTE, Surveyor General of Lower Canada, had the honour of being introduced to the REGENT by Lord Viscount Sidmouth, and had a private audience, when the Colonel presented to His Royal Highness his topographical works of the Canadas, which were most graciously received.

BOSTON, JULY 18.

Affairs in South America.

Our accounts from this quarter, are extremely desultory, and are seldom to be relied on.—Some recent reports, would make it appear that the revolutionists were generally successful; but the following authentic Proclamation shews, that at Santa Fee, the Royalists have succeeded in restoring tranquillity to that vice-kingdom:—

Carthaginians! The king's arms already occupy Santa Fee, and all this kingdom. The bands of rebels which the royal troops met in their rout, only distinguished themselves by their cowardice, their robbery, and their excesses on the defenceless and oppressed people, when they could commit them with impunity. They have vanished like smoke before the army, and the members of the ridiculous Congress are dispersed, who, being uncertain of their fate, have sought an asylum in the mountains among the Indians. More than a thousand of the revolutionary soldiers came over to our troops voluntarily, within two days; and nothing but the acclamations and cries of long live the King and his valiant warriors, are heard throughout the capital and the neighbouring towns. The laws are revived every where; tranquillity is restored to the inhabitants of the New Kingdom of Grenada, and unanimity will bind the hearts and affections of our seduced brothers, who will no longer embroil their hands in one another's blood: the intrigue and criminal intentions of the ambitious are exposed to their view, so that their hatred is now converted to love; they have cast away their fratricide swords, and at the feet of the most just Sovereign, implore his clemency, desiring to bury in oblivion all past evils, and resign themselves sincerely to the arms of peace.

Piracy and Murder.

Capt. Fosdick arrived at New-York, from Rio Janeiro, states, that on the night of the 30th of March last, Capt. E. Bennum, late of New Haven, Conn. and master of the sch'r Wellington, was barbarously murdered by the mate and crew of said sch'r and his body thrown overboard in the harbour of Rio Janeiro, and had not been found at the time Capt. F. sailed. The above schooner traded under English colors from Rio Janeiro to the River Plate. The crew were principally Englishmen; the mate, who was supposed to be the murderer, is a Portuguese. They were all in prison. The English merchants at Rio Janeiro had subscribed 600 milres for the prosecution of the mate and crew.

Indian Affairs.

Gen. Smith with about 1000 regular troops, is erecting a fort on Rock Island, one of the most healthy and commanding in the Mississippi. Though the Indians observe this operation with jealousy, they are nevertheless friendly, and appear attached so him, who well knows that fear only can restrain them from hostilities. The Osage and Pawnee Indians justify the assassinations they have committed on the white hunters, on the ground of their being wanton trespassers. They say these hunters kill more Buffaloes in one year than would support both nations (10,000 souls) for the same period; and that 4000 buffaloes were killed last fall to procure one boat load of tallow. Thousands of these animals are killed by the whites for the sake of their tongues and tallow. The Osages complain that white settlements are forming in the midst of their hunting grounds, 500 miles W. of the Mississippi.—*St. Louis paper.*

HALIFAX, JULY 30.

We have received our regular files of English papers by the Grace. Their contents were however anticipated by those we had received by the ship Rosary. Commercial and Agricultural distress still continues to prevail in the Mother Country, and we regret to see so many of her inhabitants emigrating from it into France, thus relieving themselves from a temporary inconvenience, but inflicting a permanent wound upon the land of their fathers.

The following extract from the Grace's log-book, completely contradicts the report in the London papers, and published here, of the commencement of Hostilities by the Algerines against Great-Britain:—*Halifax Journal.*

"June 19, in lat. 47, 25, long. 14. fell in with Lord Exmouth's squadron, from the Mediterranean, 6 sail of the line, two frigates, and two brigs—was boarded by an Officer, belonging to one of the brigs, who said that there was no truth in the report of the Algerines having violated the Treaty entered into with them by Lord Exmouth."
